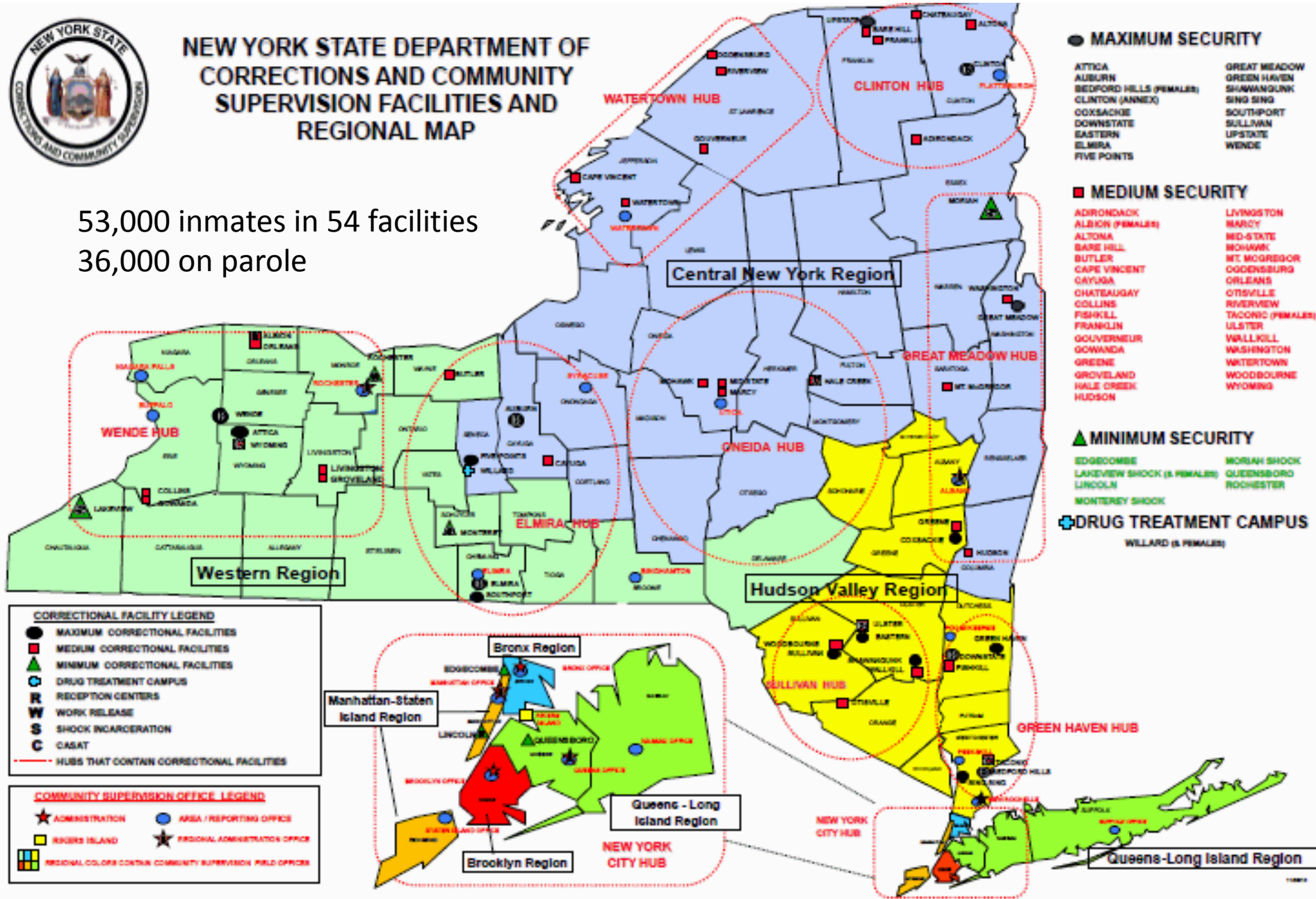

The plan

A collaboration of NYS Department of Corrections and Community Supervision, NYS Department of Health, Harm Reduction Coalition, other CBOs and local health departments

- DOCCS has committed to training all soon-to-be-released inmates on opioid overdose prevention with naloxone and to offer them kits upon release
 - ~22,000 releases each year
- Registered nurses in DOCCS are empowered to administer naloxone in the case of a suspected overdose without a patient-specific order from a physician

Implementation

- Staff training
 - ▣ Many staff members request kits for use in their own communities
 - ▣ Staff in a rural area made a special request for training have had family members overdose
- Selecting trainers
 - ▣ Correctional officers
 - ▣ Medical staff
 - ▣ Inmates
 - ▣ Community based organizations

Community Supervision/Parole

- Inmates perceive being in the presence of drugs as a potential for being sent back to prison “Getting violated”
 - ▣ In fact parole violation is more complicated
 - ▣ Many people on parole have used kits which they received in the community
- Parole officer trainings – 2
 - ▣ General agreement that parolees can and should carry kits
 - ▣ Most parole officers wanted kits for their own communities
- On the wish list: a parolee able to publically recount using a kit received on release

Focus group of inmates

- Many had witnessed deaths due to overdose
- Believe that they are a group that can save lives- they live in the areas where overdoses happen
- Dubious of the protection provided by the law- very afraid of arrest at scene of overdose; don't feel they have the same rights as other citizens
- Trainings need to be given by individuals they trust (or they deem credible), preferably other inmates or people on parole
